





I write this whilst trying to entertain David. I know that the ideal would be that David would be asleep and therefore I could write uninterrupted but I am sure that you can understand that life is not like that! During my first staff meeting, my maternity leave was obviously discussed and we concluded that maternity leave is probably more focused than a sabbatical. Although there are days when I think I would have preferred to have waited for a sabbatical! Maternity leave has taught me a lot about myself as a Methodist. I realised that I

had never been a Methodist purely by choice. I attended a Methodist Chapel as a teenager because it was the only thing to do on a Sunday afternoon and it was a place where I was loved and encouraged by other Christians. Then when I became a Local Preacher I went to a Methodist Church because I felt that is what Local Preachers should do. Having said that I also attended an Anglican church for midweek communion because Holy Communion is very important to me. Now I discover that I am a plan watcher - by this I mean that I look at the plan before a Sunday to see who is preaching. Yet I learnt that this does not stop me from going to hear the preacher. It just makes me interested in the worship they have to offer. I am aware of a church (in a different circuit) that nearly had its evening service cancelled because the Superintendent thought very few people went to the service. The minister told the 30 strong

congregation that they need go when the Superintendent preached as well as when she preached!

I find that I like to see what the hymns are before the service starts as I enjoy a good sing and like learning new hymns. Traditional Methodist worship of the kind I grew up with is not very exciting especially if the sermon is not very inspiring. On the other hand the preachers that I heard were very good and I enjoyed listening to what they had to say even if having a minister in the congregation made them nervous. However, I wonder how people can be encouraged to engage more with the bible so that they feel motivated to read the bible for themselves during the week.

Finally, I observe three things: Firstly, there is nothing more powerful than a loving church family in the lives of Christians. Secondly, I am grateful to David Edmondson for balancing five churches so that I could get to know my new son! Finally the most important meetings are the chance encounters where we share our faith rather than where we sort out the running of the church. After all this is what Jesus told us we should do.

Service Times - Morning Worship

Following a number of discussions at Staff and Trustee level over the last few months, we have decided to call an Extra United Area Meeting to discuss the one item:

Sunday Service times and the associated 'Plan Issues'.

We feel that this is a necessary discussion for two reasons:

1. Forthcoming Staff reduction and other changes from September onwards, which will inevitably lead to an increase in the number of Local Appointments & Worship Leaders Services being designated on the Quarterly Plan.
2. The need for Ministers to preach at their sectional Churches as often as possible to enable the building of relationships with that Minister, continuity in worship and preaching (which in a number of cases nationally is a proven catalyst for Church growth).

As an example, from September Jenet's section will be Trinity, Vickerstown and Hartington St; to enable her to lead Sunday morning worship at each Church as regularly as possible service times at the respective Churches would have to change to allow her to lead worship twice on a Sunday morning. Similarly service times in Ron's and Rachel's sections will also need to complement each other to allow them to lead worship twice on a Sunday morning.

With this in mind, and the current shortfall in Local Preachers, we ask Church members to consider a possible change in Sunday morning service time at your Church (we are probably looking for changes to 9:30am or 11:00am - if you are not already at those times) to help facilitate more 'doubles' on the plan. Other ideas however would be considered.

The extra United Area Meeting for Church representatives is:

Wednesday 7th May @ 7:00pm @ Dalton URC (Market Street)

Thank you for your consideration of this important matter which, if left unchanged/unchallenged will lead to more local responsibility in finding preachers. Please ensure that your church is represented at this meeting, and that those attending have already had some preliminary discussions of these issues with other members of the congregation.

Bibleworld

Please continue to pray for the impact of the “BibleWorld” project which will be open in Barrow from lunchtime on Monday 16th June to lunchtime on Friday 20th. The exact venue is not yet confirmed (we’re trying to borrow a patch of supermarket car park) but is likely to be in the Hindpool area, as the week is being organised from Hartington St church with the backing of the United Area and some funding from the Methodist District. Housed in a 45ft fold-out trailer, on the road it looks like one of the big lorries you see pulling out of the paper mill just in front of you on Park Road. There are 6 different “Activity Zones”: the Library, the Aeroplane, the Quiz Zone, The Museum, The Spaceship and the Music Zone. In these zones the children engage in a wide variety of high and low-tech activities. A class of junior school children visit Bible World for 70 minutes, splitting into 6 small groups with each group visiting 3 of the Zones. It’s a bit like “Flashbacks” designed for slightly older children. In the course of the week, a dozen classes will pass through (2 each morning, 1 each afternoon), and each is given a workbook and a magazine version of Luke’s gospel to take away with them. The material is designed to fit in with the National Curriculum, so we hope to have no problem attracting school classes. BibleWorld will also be open on the evenings of the 18th and 19th of June, for people like you to come and have a look at what we are doing. Do pay us a visit - I’m sure you’d be very interested to see how the Bible can be presented in ways which appeal to today’s children, and if you like what you see feel free to contribute towards the cost of bringing the lorry to Barrow (which is costing a couple of thousand pounds - it sounds good value if you consider it to be about £7 for every child who will visit the project).


We would welcome volunteers to help with the project: ideally 2 or 3 adults per session. We could do with more people around for the two evenings to chat to visitors who are “just looking”. BibleWorld has the potential to make a really big difference to a child’s way of looking at the stories of God and Jesus contained in the Bible, and we hope you will want to support it.

April Showers - Water for Life

We associate April with showers. In Al Jolson's famous words, 'Though April showers may come your way they bring the flowers that bloom in May'. There is profound truth here - rain is essential for life on earth. The Bible

includes water in its opening words, even before it mentions life on earth. 'The earth was void and empty, and darkness was on the face of the deep. And God's Spirit moved over the waters'. (Gen. 1.21)

Water nourishes life. Our Christian lives begin with water at our baptism. All four gospels narrate Jesus' own public baptism in the Jordan by the Baptist. His ministry climaxed at Caesarea Philippi near the source of the Jordan. At Jesus' death water flowed from his side onto our earth.

Local churches should witness to Christian respect for water. We can harvest rain in hall downpipes and cisterns and use that water for baptism, flowers, and cleaning, and then return it to plants in the 'living churchyard'. In our homes, including flats, we can respect water. The RSPB suggests we create little 'rain gardens', simply by making a slight depression in the ground near rain runoff.

Then we can plant a few native plants tolerant of occasional temporary flooding. Those plants, with a regular supply of natural water provide a mini habitat for wildlife. The RSPB says, 'However modest in size rain-gardens can play an important role in restoring natural water cycles in urban areas, which is good news for urban wildlife.'

The Big Silence

Some of you will know that I recently went on an eight day silent retreat to St Beuno's Spirituality Centre in North Wales. Whilst I was there I bought a DVD of the BBC TV programme, The Big Silence (which was screened in 2010) part of which was filmed at St Beuno's. The Big Silence shows how 5 people, coming from very different backgrounds, none of whom were practising Christians, were part of an experiment to build silence into their lives. It is a very interesting programme looking at how silence can affect a person both in their everyday life and their spirituality.
