





The Minister Writes



When we were on holiday recently, Graham (my husband) was looking for a new T-shirt with a slogan on the front of it. So we went round quite a few different shops and two large open air markets to try and find one. Some of the slogans we saw were downright rude or somewhat disgusting; others were whimsical or gently poking fun at the person who would be wearing it. There were occasional ones which amused me such as *Always give 100% at work: 12% on Monday, 23% on Tuesday, 20% on Wednesday, 40% on Thursday*

and 5% on Friday.

One which made me think was this: *Atheism, a non-prophet organisation* - is atheism really an organisation and, in any case, isn't someone like Richard Dawkins a prophet for atheism as he is a well-known spokesperson for that belief system? So I felt the person who had coined that slogan for the T shirt hadn't got it quite right.

Another in the religious line was *Dear God, thanks for beer, women and football. Keep up the good work!* But the one which made most caught my attention was *Dream without fear, Love without limits* because it seemed to me that this, without even mentioning any kind of spirituality, had captured much of what the Christian Gospel is all about. There are quite a number of places in the Bible where the reassurance 'not to fear' is given - the first (I think) is in Genesis 15 when God makes his covenant with Abram(Abraham) and says his offspring

will be as many as the stars in the night sky. Or you only have to think of the angelic visits to people in the Christmas story for examples in the New Testament. God does not want us to live in a state of fear - in our dreams or in our actual daily life - but in a state of trust in him. I think this is part of what is meant when Jesus said he had come that people could have life, and have it to the full. Excessive fear can block our development and be detrimental to our personalities.

The phrase, *Love without limits*, reminded me of Jesus' words 'Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you'. It is very easy to fall into the habit of keeping our love within fairly strict boundaries and only loving those whom we like!

I think one of my favourite slogans is one attributed to Augustine: *Love God and do what you like*. If our lives are controlled by love of God then our actions will also be godly. As you see me around at our various churches, please do tell me what your favourite slogan or quote is, and why.

Volunteer Opportunities At Barrow Foodbank

Our coordinators play a vital part in the running of the Foodbank and we have vacancies for 2 of these posts. In keeping with our ethos as a Christian Charity we are hoping to fill these voluntary posts from within the churches. We hope that someone from one of your congregations may be led to volunteer for one of these posts.

Voucher Holder Coordinator

This post is a key role within the Foodbank. Distribution of food to those in need is the core business of the Foodbank. People in crisis are assessed by our voucher holders (front line agencies and professionals who normally meet these people in the course of their work. In this way we can be sure that not only is there a proper assessment of their immediate need but also the longer term requirements of the client are met. Identifying, and getting these agencies/ professionals to sign up to the process requires a good deal of initial effort but as the successful outcomes are recognised other agencies follow suit. Our former voucher holder coordinator has established an excellent base of voucher holders with whom he also had a good working relationship. The voucher holder coordinator needs to meet with potential new voucher holders while also maintaining the good communication between existing voucher holders and the Foodbank.

This post requires a good deal of time and diplomacy ensuring the needs of the voucher holders are met. The role also involves ensuring that checks are in place to ensure against the abuse of the Foodbank by those individuals who wish “to work the system” for their own ends. Initial support to the new post holder has been offered by the present post holder.

Church Representative Coordinator

This post is an essential part of the Foodbank and while not always visible is nonetheless pivotal in the smooth every day running of the Foodbank. He/she liaises with the church representatives who encourage their congregation to donate food and deliver it to the Foodbank. Part of this role is to keep churches updated and feed back to them how much food they have donated. Most of this work is done through e-mail. Full training and support is given.

On our second day, Cass goes off with Willem, to help, and take some photographs and I go along to the classrooms to spend time with the children. The staff and resident children are waiting for the bus to bring in the other pre-schoolers. I try doing some action songs with them, and they respond well - even adding some more verses to one song, which they seem to know better than me (like the song - by your pupils you'll be taught). We end up playing ring a roses - and of course the falling down bit is the best bit, I am delighted. As the bus children arrive the children give in their school bags, with their lunches and its 'toilet time'. I was touched to see one of the more extrovert little girl, take Kqotofatso's hand, and lead her into the toilet, pull down her knickers and sit her on the potty, so caring.

Cass and I had brought two tins of chocolates and two small jars of sweets from home and we went into the play ground and the children were asked to line up to receive these. One of the staff handed out the chocolates and I offered the sweets to another line of children. It was very moving to see one little boy, who pulled out two sweets stuck together, but he didn't put them both into his own mouth, but pulled them apart and gave one to another little chap at his side - such a simple act but one of love. The children line up for class after chanting with one of the teachers. I do not appreciate what they are saying at first, then realise the teacher is saying 'The bible says' love one another' and the each child turns to the next one and gives them a big hug.

I sit in with the little one's class and enjoy watching them colouring, then go into the middle class where the teacher is showing them drawings of parts of the body and asking them to colour them a certain colour, which they have to select from their pencil boxes - these I note are empty food tins - what a good idea. Reminds me of how we improvised in playgroup days. One by one the children disappear, and I realise they've gone to the toilet, teacher goes with them and one of the smarter boys in the class takes over and follows on with the lesson!!

Later the school bus brings the older children back home, and I take the other tin of chocolates to share with them. The children were having a snack - which I guess children all over the world do after school, and receive the chocolates with thanks. Somehow the chocolates stretch a long way, to all the children and around the volunteers and staff as well - (just like feeding the 5,000) some left over for another day,

The morning we leave Avril and Willem's we noticed a bird flapping in their swimming pool, Avril fishes it out with a large scoop and takes it to 'Dr Willem' 'he will know what to do!' It was only a baby bird, but Willem declares it strong enough to survive. Perhaps all the children in Lebone are like little birds, and their lives have been scooped up, by Avril and Willem, who take them into their care and nurture them in the Lebone nest of love.

Then its time to leave, and I weep, feeling so overwhelmed by having been touched by Avril and Willem's love, and sharing for such a short time the challenge they were living each and every day. I felt we had been so privileged to share just a very short time at Lebone, and to witness the miracles performed by Avril and Willem and their staff, not only for the children but so many volunteers and their families. The initial pebble of love was thrown into the pool by Jaine and the ripples have spread so far, and just keep spreading. To go to Lebone Village was akin to visiting a bit of Heaven on earth.



Christian Aid Community Partnership



Please remember that the United Area has now signed up to the Christian Aid Afghanistan Community Partnership Project. This commits us to raising £5000 by the end of March 2015, and this amount will be matched by the European Union at a ratio of 3:1 meaning that our £5000 will effectively be worth an amazing £20,000 towards the project. The project will enable women in some of the poorest parts of Afghanistan to have a say at last in the decisions that affect them and their communities, to learn to read and write, and to receive funding to start small businesses. Less than 13% of Afghan women are literate, and Afghanistan has the highest maternal mortality rate in the world.

Thanks for the money collected so far: we now have passed the first £500 - a tenth of the way there! £20 came from Ramsden St following the Maundy Thursday service, and the Edmondson birthday barbecue at Vickerstown raised £330 pounds. Please remember, if you do raise any money for Christian Aid to go towards our total, please pass the money through your church accounting system in the usual way, and then send it to Bob Mantle (payable to South West Cumbria United Area but with a clear note saying it is for Christian Aid). Please let me know if you are planning an event, so we can both help to advertise them and avoid potential clashes; the offering from the COG Slog will go here, and there is a planned quiz at Beacon Hill on

October 18th. I have a display about the project and how a community partnership works that I will happily lend to anyone holding an event, and a labelled sweet jar which makes an eye-catching collection point. Imaginative ideas welcomed!

Intrigued and with no further details I waited in the chapel for their arrival at 11:30am on Friday 3rd May. Archbishop Luke and Bishop Chris from the Methodist Connexion in Nigeria had been at Cliff College in Calver, Derbyshire for two weeks as part of an Outreach Programme. With a couple of days spare before going home they were invited by the Cumbria District to see something of the workings of the Methodist Church in our county. They asked lots of questions about The Furness Faith Trail and were interested in the history of our chapel. They were fascinated by the age of our places of worship as at home they are continually pulling down temporary buildings to build ever-larger churches. Bishop Chris has an expanding congregation of over 200,000 who expect a Sunday service to last at least 2 hours. Without faith in God to sustain them, they would have no hope to continue their daily lives, he explained. They thanked me for making our chapel available to them and for talking about Christianity today in Britain.
