Whilst we were in Brazil we stayed with families from the churches - I was blessed to have stayed with a delightful family in a lovely house with a swimming pool! It's fair to say that we were all very well looked after and welcomed into each home as part of the family. Iguazu Falls is one of the 7 New Wonders of Nature so we also took the time to visit the waterfalls and nature reserves.

The aim of the trip was to equip and encourage the churches in Iguazu Falls. As a team we preached and shared testimony in the churches, hosted a mission conference and engaged in street evangelism. I was privileged to preach at Central's main service where I was translated by the Bishop (the equivalent of our Chair of District) so no pressure there then! I also addressed a ladies' house group and was one of the speakers at the mission conference. At Central I preached about how we should step out

At the beginning of April I was privileged to be part of a mission team that travelled from the UK to Iguazu Falls, Brazil.

Altogether there were 24 of us from four Methodist churches. We ranged in age from 13 to 78, with the majority of the team being over 65. Whilst we were there we worked with three Methodist churches in the town - Central, Cataratas and Portal da Foz. All of the churches were encouraged by our visit and wanted us to send warm greetings back to the church in the UK.



## **Cumbria Methodist Synod, 6 May 2017**

The theme for the Spring Synod at Grange was 'Developing Discipleship'. In his sermon during the opening worship, Rev Richard Teal urged us to remember that the Methodist calling to mission does not just involve the sharing of our story of the difference Jesus Christ has made in our lives, but also the deepening of our own relationship with God and the working out of our faith in social action. The various speakers during the day all contributed to different aspects of those elements of our faith journey - we were encouraged to participate in 'Moving Mountains', heard from the Churches Trust for Cumbria about the guidance and advice they can offer in relation to the maintenance and use of our buildings, were inspired by stories from Milnthorpe where the previously closed church is now a thriving community centre and where they are now looking for ways to engage with the spiritual needs of the community and listened to Rachel Williams describe the 'Massive Messy Church' organised by the North Cumbria Circuit at Talkin Tarn. We were also reminded that the new Youth and Children's Development Worker, Emma Richardson, is available to offer help and advice. And lastly, we were reminded that far from London though we might be, Methodists in Cumbria have the opportunity to shape Methodist policy and practice. Synod agreed to send forward two memorials to Conference. One related to the 'Balfour Declaration' which was an important step in the process that created the State of Israel. The UK government signed up to it 100 years ago but has failed to honour, asking for an acknowledgement of that failure and asking for the production of materials through the Joint Public Issues Team that will help people gain a deeper understanding of the complex matters of justice and reconciliation in the Holy Land. The second memorial sought to enable people who feel called to ordained ministry but who are not able to offer for itinerancy, the opportunity to train as 'self-supporting ministers' - what our Anglican colleagues used to call 'non-stipendiary'. Here in Cumbria, along with our ecumenical partners, within our vision of 'God for All' we aim to grow more worshipping communities, but as church finances are squeezed and the supply of itinerant ministers of all denominations continues to diminish, serving our existing churches whilst growing new ones will be a considerable challenge. We want and need to encourage and grow lay ministry, but we will also need ordained clergy to work alongside them. Part-time, self-supporting ministers would be an important element in providing the flexibility of ministry we need to meet God's call to develop our discipleship and live out his call to serve the church and the world.

## Workshops

There was one topic for the four workshops at Synod. It was 'Discipleship and Evangelism', and Paul Wilson led a session looking at 'How we tell our story'. How do we outreach to our community, and share our faith? 'What is church?' - Sunday worship, or messy church, midweek coffee and chat. 'Church' is not necessarily the way we see it - Sunday morning/evening worship. Today there are many forms of 'church' and it is important that we encompass different ideas.

We divided into smaller groups to continue to tease out what 'Discipleship' means in our church community, and how we go about making disciples for Jesus. There were suggestions for how we might begin - small groups; a feeling of belonging; maybe appoint a 'Prayer and Spirituality' Steward; pastoral care; to avoid making assumptions about people; to be enthusiastic; and be intentional in our teaching.

Overall consensus was the importance of Prayer - 'Prayer for Evangelism'. It was felt that a group of 6-8 was a good number to pray together. We also felt that it was important that everything begins with prayer.

In conclusion, there were many good suggestions about how we can 'Tell our story', and encourage others to look at the difference Jesus can make in our lives. There are various opportunities in the next eighteen months for all of us to be intentional about being 'Fishers of Men', from 'Thy Kingdom Come' in June, to 'Believe in Barrow' in September, and 'Moving Mountains' in March 2018.

The group led by Rev Les Wallace focused on prayer groups, both conventional and unconventional, as a way of making connections and sharing God's love. People enjoyed the fellowship and sense of belonging in small prayer groups and valued having someone to pray with. In one church, the prayer group meets 25 minutes before every Sunday service; other groups meet rather earlier (prayers at 7 am, anyone?) and in some unusual places. One of the early morning groups prays regularly at Beacon Edge overlooking Penrith and enjoys communing with nature as well as each other. In fact, some groups really benefit from breaking out of the confines of church, finding it a good way to overcome barriers and reach different kinds of people. One group organizes Sunday Adventures for families - a walk in the country and a chat. In the north of the county, games of Walking Football for the 'no longer quite so fit' often finish with tea and fellowship. In seeking to reach out, it's necessary to find a way to communicate that people can relate to, and we were also reminded not to make friends targets. Sometimes, the people we seek to bring in may not be ready or may turn away; but they are still our friends and God loves them. Although one member of the group found it frustrating that very few people in his prayer circle were prepared to lead the prayers, others pointed out that, in fact, nothing needs to be said aloud. There is a beauty in sitting together and praying in silence, resting in the warmth of God's love.

## **Aldersgate Day ‘Love Feast’**

In the hope that most people will receive their copy of Newslink before the end of May, we include the following invitation from Trinity:

It was 24<sup>th</sup> May 1738. John Wesley was almost 35 years old and had been ordained for nearly 10 years. The ‘society’ he attended was a Moravian meeting in London. Wesley had first encountered the Moravian Church during a difficult two-year mission to Georgia in North America, from which he had returned just six months earlier. During the journey, their ship had been struck by a severe storm, and shipwreck and death seemed inevitable to most aboard. What Wesley noticed was the calm assurance of the Moravians: confident in God’s love and their salvation, they did not appear to fear death. Wesley did not have that assurance. He was struggling at this point in his life, when it was far from certain that the beginnings of a religious revival would take hold and flourish. John Wesley’s experience at the Aldersgate meeting transformed his belief and preaching, ultimately leading to the formation of the Methodist Church. Without Aldersgate, Methodism as we know it today may not have happened.

But Aldersgate is not just about the past, or just about John Wesley. His experience, so memorably and vividly expressed in his journal, demonstrates the difference it makes knowing God for ourselves. When one least expects it, even when things haven’t turned out the way we hoped or when we feel we’ve heard it all before, there can be change. Change happens when we share the story. Wesley experienced this when someone else read to him Martin Luther’s Preface to Romans. Just as John Wesley felt his heart ‘strangely warmed’, we too can be refreshed and inspired by sharing our faith stories with each other. What story can you tell?

At 6:30 pm on the evening of 28<sup>th</sup> May, there will be a ‘Love Feast’ at Trinity Church Centre to celebrate Aldersgate Day (24<sup>th</sup> May). Love Feasts were a vital part of the practice of the early Methodist societies, intended to be occasions for celebrating our faith journey and encouraging one another, sharing our stories of God at work. At our Love Feast we’ll acknowledge and give thanks and praise for all that God has given us, and is doing in our lives and churches. Aldersgate also provides the opportunity to consider how we live out our commitment in response to God’s love and grace. How can we give back to the Church generously with our time, passion and money? Why not come along and join in?

# Askam

Askam Sisterhood finished for the summer months on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> May. As the speaker for the afternoon was ill, Dorothy talked about Christian Aid, and how this year it's 60 years since it was formed. Reading from the CA magazine she told the members about Theodor Davidovic - a former refugee who is a living testament to the difference that having a safe place to call home can make. He fought in the Serbian resistance against Germany as a teenager. In the chaos across Europe after the end of the Second World War he lived in refugee camps in Germany and Italy for two years. The similarities with today's huge movement of people across the globe are hard to ignore. Theodor himself says: "The camps were like the refugee camps you see nowadays filled with tents. We were allocated one blanket each and had to gather straw or grass to make a mattress." 70 years on, Theodor has built a life in Scotland but is still deeply moved by the support he received as a refugee. He says he owes his life to the help of organisations, including CA, which gave him something he could rely on: **warmth, and food, the chance to feel safe, hope for his future.** "It was Christian Aid who fed us, and I will never forget it. That is why I volunteer for CA who helped me to survive."

Using verses of the hymn 'When I needed a neighbour' the Sisterhood and guests then sang and prayed for all the projects which CA is still helping. We pray for all volunteers who help in any way to keep Christian Aid functioning.

We were challenged by a Biblical Quiz, arranged by Val Hall (our Treasurer) and this really got the 'grey matter' working. Well done to Mary Willan for getting top marks in the quiz. We ended the celebratory afternoon with a lovely tea - thanks to all the generosity of the members.

The Annual Garden Party will be held on Saturday, 1<sup>st</sup> July at 2:30 pm - 4:00 pm and all are very welcome. This year we will be working with our friends from St. Peter's Church, Ireleth.
