I'm sure you'll join me in welcoming Jennet back from her sabbatical and in looking forward to hearing about what she has learned through it.

The last two months have been particularly busy for me as two projects that I have been working on for some time are finally coming to fruition. Barrow Street Angels had its launch service on Monday 25th September at Trinity Church Centre where we commissioned more than twenty volunteers. By the time you read this we will have been out on patrol in Barrow town centre a number of times.

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Street Angels are volunteers who go into the town centre on Saturday nights helping people who are vulnerable or in need. We distribute flip flops to ladies who are carrying their shoes and lollipops and bottled water to those who would benefit, we offer basic first aid and generally make the town centre a safer place to be at night. It shows that the church cares about the community and the people of the town. We are looking for more volunteers and more flip flops and lollipops. Please let me know if you think you can help.

The second project that's finally being realised is the re:new Community Charity Shop. We hope to have the keys to a lovely shop on Cavendish Street, Barrow on the 1st November and plan to open the shop to customers the following week (in time for Christmas!). The shop will give the option for volunteers to gain work-related skills and will be an encouraging and positive place to work.

It will also create an opportunity for Christians to work alongside other volunteers leading to opportunities for us to share our faith and invite our new friends to suitable events. The profits from the shop will be used to support worthwhile local projects. We have employed a shop manager, Tim Jeffries, who will be running the shop day-to-day but you can help with this exciting new venture in a number of ways. In the piece below (*Page3*) Tim will explain how - I hope that you'll find a way to support one (or both) of these ventures.

In all this busyness and excitement it would have been easy to lose sight of God. There is always a risk of getting so engrossed in the work of the Lord that we forget the Lord of the work. It takes discipline to carve out time to spend with God when you feel pulled in all directions and I believe that it's only possible when this habit has been formed in less demanding times. Cumbria Methodist Synod, 9 September 2017

The 'theme' of the Autumn Synod at Wigton Road Methodist Church in Carlisle was (like the previous Synod) again around 'discipleship', with the District Chair, Revd Richard Teal's sermon in the opening worship focusing on the 'Parable of the Sower', as told in Matthew's gospel, and the fact that despite some of the 'Word' of God not fully reaching out and being understood by some, nevertheless, all are welcome in the Kingdom of God.

Following the act of worship, the usual opening pleasantries and information were shared: letters of greeting; appointment of scrutineers and other District Officers and Committee changes, along with dates of future meetings - note next Synod is Saturday 28th April, venue to be confirmed but likely to be at Sedbergh.

A short presentation was then given of an overview of this year's Methodist Conference, with particular expression given of a 'deeply profound and moving experience' felt by Revd Tim Cooke from our District on his Ordination. There followed the election of representatives to next Conference with our own Debbie Buckley being amongst those elected to attend.

The next presentation and main item for the Synod was the Connexional Launch of the new 'Discipling Presence' document, this following on from the highly regarded predecessor of a number of years ago 'Presence', and one that will help equip us to move forward as a Christian presence enabling people to become disciples of Jesus, particularly in the context of current rural contexts, each section of the document containing contemporary stories; a relevant Bible Story; and three practical things to have a go at!

Then came a short introduction to the churches "Equality, Diversity and Inclusion" Toolkit resource, which lead us all then to sample some of the aspect covered in brief workshops: ie Class and Economic Justice; Disability and Impairment; Gender; Race; and Sexual Orientation, some of which were attended and are reported on separately below.

Other items on the agenda included: Moving Mountains update - 34 groups in the county next March, 9 to be led by Methodist leaders; Property - which agreed to the 'cease to meet' of the Frostgill Chapel (of the Sedbergh Circuit); Safeguarding - Cumbria to employ its own 'Officer'; and Good News slots - which included: 'Mining for God' worship down Honiston Mine when 96 chilled people attended but thoroughly enjoyed, the encouraging developments of the Sedbergh Mission Community, the Argentinian Partnership Visit by Irene McKay and the Skelton Show. And finally, Graham Ransome gave a brief overview of a 'weighty' document and Bible Study resource which contains 'what it says on the tin' simply "Disciple", and one which he has used and highly recommends.

Overall, one of the more informative, encouraging and enthusing Synods of recent years.

Reports From Synod Workshops

Class and Economic Justice

Although we ran out of time very quickly we did manage to look at a few things. We were given two markers; one said 'agree' and the other 'disagree', and they were placed some distance apart on the floor. We were then asked a series of questions and had to stand somewhere along the line that identified if we agreed or not with the statement. Some of the things we were asked:

Is there still a class system?

Is the living wage enough for families to live on?

The group discussion brought up the following comments: Maybe there is no such thing as class in today's society? Are we more likely to be judged by the possessions we have rather than where we come from? For some families the living wage could be enough, however if someone had to use public transport each day to get to work then it was unlikely to be enough. Being a rural community without a good bus service also proved to have an effect on families and access to jobs, schools etc.

Another question was: Is our happiness affected by the amount of money we have? The response was: Is it money or possessions that give people happiness? Can people ever be happy when debt is increasing and loans are very very expensive??

It was agreed by the group that there are always different ways of hearing and interpreting the question!! There were a lot of different responses to what first appeared to be basic questions. But as with most moral issues the answers are never black and white. For instance when we ask if poverty is on the increase, well that depends on what you mean by poverty!! Statistically 1200 children live in poverty in the South Lakes and 3600 on low incomes live on benefits. Wages in Cumbria tend to be lower than the national average. The number of homeless people is increasing in Cumbria.

We finished with the following story: a homeless man joined a Bible study as he was searching for God, the Bible study group didn't like the fact that he was a bit dirty and unclean so they eventually turned him away and he then turned from God!!

Disability and Impairment

This workshop was led by Edel Maclean. While the Equality Act of 2010 has achieved a lot, there is still a long way to go in terms of changing culture. Exactly who is a disabled person? A disabled person is a person who lives with disability; the person is not the disability, though this is still often the view of society. Churches can do more to show understanding, to become 'enabling churches'. The important thing is not to make assumptions, but to try to put ourselves in the other person's shoes. One example given was of a blind man and a church hall refit, where members were working on the

interior. The blind man arrived with his wife and his guide dog, wanting to help with the work. The other members were all very wary and worried that he would hurt himself; and yet, given a specific task, he proved to be very adept with a hammer. Most importantly, he felt included, which made him happy. Edel talked about Harry, an autistic boy who can sometimes be disruptive; but, by accepting and sitting alongside him, church members learned about Harry and what triggered his behaviour, and so knew what to avoid, which made church visits better for Harry and the congregation. In some churches, there is no appropriate place for members in a wheelchair; it is expected that they will be 'parked' at the back or at the front. How much better it is when a church can move seats, or has a shorter pew, allowing the person in the wheelchair to sit with their family. Small changes can make a difference, like signs for dementia sufferers. Building trust and relationships is really important for people like the bipolar teenager who is scared to open up about her condition because of how people may react. Edel's message was that everyone is an individual, so we need to sit alongside them and learn.

Race

Following a brief introduction from the leader of this workshop, Moses John, with him sharing some of his own experiences of what could be termed 'mild racial discrimination', we went on to sample some of the activities suggested in the module on this subject.

This started with a 'Privilege Game' with each little group or pairing giving answers to various questions surrounding 'having been given the basic background of 10 'imaginary' people eg age, sex, colour etc,' such as 'which of these has never suffered racial abuse?' 'which can speak 3 languages?' Surprising how 'stereo-typical' our answers were! Then came another exercise around 'Islamaphobia' in which we were asked to read one of several 'scenarios' and respond to questions set: ours regarding the story of a woman wearing a 'Jilbad' over her face and having it forcibly removed by 'yobs' - a little more elaborate than that but we were asked not to detail any of the 'scenarios' too much so as not to 'spoil it for others' who may do the 'module' at a later date.

However, we concluded that we all need to be more aware of some of these instances that happen around us, reflect prayerfully on the situation and try not to be culturally biased against those 'different' from ourselves.

Christian Aid Community Partnership

In February 2013 the churches of the United Area began to raise money for a Christian Aid community project working with women in Afghanistan, with a target of £5,000. This amount was raised by June 2014 so we then began fundraising for a maternal and child health project in Kenya. Another £5,000 was raised by June 2016. In both cases a further £15,000 was added to our total by the European Union, meaning that we were responsible for raising £20,000 for each project.

At Ramsden Street on 11th October Laura Jones, Christian Aid's Regional Co-ordinator for Cumbria, spoke to a small but appreciative audience about the second project. She showed slides of some of the women of Narok County in Kenya whose lives have been transformed in a way she described as 'revolutionary'. Beginning with a situation where for every 100,000 live births 435 women died, the state was reached where not a single mother or baby died.

This was achieved in several ways:

- training community health workers and re-training traditional birth attendants as mother companions
- empowering women through education in antenatal care, breastfeeding and vaccinations, nutrition and hygiene, and through the provision of small loans
- equipping the community with two 4x4 ambulances and 3 ambulance motorbikes, malaria nets, vitamins and emergency birth packs
- changing attitudes, including men now supporting their wives and the government providing training for traditional birth attendants.

One slide reminded us of the many ways in which the Area raised the money to help with this project. Laura presented a certificate of thanks to each church.

She also read from the book 'The Spirituality of Fundraising' by Henri Nouwen, showing that fundraising is a form of ministry and helps to build God's Kingdom. Laura ended by introducing a new project, which will help children in Kenya affected by HIV and AIDS. This will be part-funded by USAID, who will give £17 for every £1 raised. There is no minimum amount of money to be raised, but as an example £5,000 would provide a total of £90,000. This is worth thinking about - it seems to be too good an opportunity to miss.

Children and Youth Work

Trinity: Messy Church in September clashed with the Believe in Barrow Weekend. The number of children fluctuates from 17 or 18 up to 40 with adults.

Beacon Hill: The Sunday School mostly consists of children from one family; the two youngest are about to be christened.

Dalton: The Holiday Club was a good event, based on Scripture Union material. Children from the Holiday Club were invited to do a presentation at St. Mary's Church but none showed up on the day.

Askam: A christening is planned for Sunday 22nd October - the baby daughter of Harriet and Dan Cooper, who were married at Duddon Road last year.

Mission Community Progress

Believe in Barrow 2017 Real Lives was a ten day series of events across Barrow, with live music, good news and real life stories. The aim was to introduce people to Jesus Christ and the life-changing difference he makes. There were about 19 local events including a Big Breakfast, a Yarn Bomb, a Dance Show and BBQ, film showings, and an Open Mic Cafe.

Robin Ham did a lot of the work, and has since formed a group praying for a weekly church at Holbeck - called Grace Church - with a soft launch initially. The team meet each Tuesday for prayer and worship at Robin's home, and are studying Ephesians. There is a youth worker available for special Youth Services.

It is not known at present whether Believe in Barrow broke even. There is still a Coffee Morning fortnightly at Roose School.

Moving Mountains

Autumn Allsorts is being arranged for Dalton, in a marquee outside Dalton Community Church in Market Street, each Saturday of half-term.

Also there will be a further Autumn Allsorts at Askam - during a Coffee Morning organised by St. Peter's congregation on Saturday 25th November.

Fair Trade

Dalton is in the final stages of becoming a Fair Trade Town. The Steering Group runs a Coffee Morning each month. Barrow needs to get a steering committee together to renew its Fair Trade status.

Food Bank

There is still a great need. We all need to lobby our MPs.

There is now a counsellor at the Food Bank to give guidance.

In October/November we will be told about Christmas requirements.

Charity Shop

Tim Jeffries has been employed as Manager of the Charity Shop in Cavendish Street, and needs volunteers and donations of goods.

Dementia Friendly Churches

Churches are encouraged to look at worship if they have people with dementia problems, maybe consider the length of the service or have one tailored to their needs, with old familiar hymns, readings, etc.

Cumbria's 2017 Christmas Shoebox Campaign Boxes Of Hope

Filling a shoebox is a simple and fun thing to do, doesn't have to cost a lot of money, and it really does make a difference to a child who has none of the basics we take for granted. For these children there is none of the commercialisation we endure for weeks leading up to Christmas. Many of them have never in their lives had a gift. Many have never had a toy.

The campaign runs from November 1st - 12th.

If you would like to get involved with this year's 2017 Christmas Shoebox Appeal by filling a shoebox of gifts then here below are some tips on how to do it:

- Find a medium-sized, empty shoebox (PLEASE NO BOOT BOXES), and cover the lid and box separately with any bright wrapping paper.
- Decide whether you want to make a box for a boy or a girl.
- An ideal box will contain: soap and facecloth, toothbrush and paste, hairbrush or comb, hat, scarf, mittens, socks, educational supplies such as paper, pens, pencils, colouring pencils, ruler, rubber and pencil sharpener, and then some sturdy toys such as ball, doll, toy car, dominoes, skipping rope, yo-yo. Add some treats - sparkly hair accessories or bracelet/necklace for a girl, football stickers for a boy, and some sweets - best before at least until the end of March 2018. And a cuddly toy will go down well with all ages. A plastic mug will be useful. You may like to add a photo or a greetings card to make the box gift more personal.
- And please add a donation of at least £2, in an envelope on top of the items inside your box. Your shoebox cannot be taken overseas unless we can pay for the transport.
- Tape a Boy or Girl label onto the outside of the lid, securing the box with a stout elastic band.

I will be collecting shoeboxes between 1st and the 12th November 2017 so if you would like me to collect your shoebox/shoeboxes I am happy to do so. Alternatively you can drop them off at my house. Many Thanks.

Youth Spot

When is a camp not a camp? As our preferred camping sites were not available on the weekend when the leaders were, Walney's two Cub packs held their September 'camp' this year at Rampside Village Hall. Twenty-four excitable boys aged 8-10 made the most of the opportunity, with activities and crafts based on the 'Seaside Sleepover' theme and also working towards their disability awareness badge. The two highlights for most were a very interesting visit to Barrow's lifeboat station, where they had a full tour and were even allowed to try out the crew seats of the all-weather lifeboat as well as learning about water safety, and a visit from Joan Milburn: Joan is a long-standing member of Vickerstown's congregation who has been blind for most of her life and came to share that experience with the boys as part of their badge. They were particularly impressed by her ability to tell apart different coins by touch, as soon as the coin was in her hand, and enjoyed trying on special glasses that mimic various sight problems and trying to find their way around the room without walking into things too much. The Cubs also did a treasure hunt around Rampside and a scavenger hunt on the beach, followed by a sandcastle competition where their constructions had some very imaginative back-stories about why the castles were the shape they were and what had happened to the bits that had collapsed during construction! There was some thoughtful discussion of disability, and also some games and things to let them burn off some energy. The last activity was a piñata (a Mexican tradition involving hitting, or trying to hit, a hollow frame filled with sweets or treats - ours was fish-shaped - with a stick whilst blindfolded, to get the sweets to fall out) in the car park and the noise brought the neighbours out to see what was going on. After keeping the leaders awake until after 3 a.m. on the first night, the boys were so tired by the second night that they let us have a little more sleep, and for several of the Cubs this was the first time they had ever slept away from their families which is an important step. All in all, a successful weekend, if rather tiring!

What goes in your dark red recycling bin?

Paper

such as newspapers, magazines, office paper, shredded paper, envelopes, catalogues, telephone directories, paperback books and junk mail.

Cardboard

such as cereal boxes, ready meal sleeves, corrugated cardboard boxes and packaging. Large cardboard boxes will be collected if presented next to your recycling bin

Food tins and drink cans

such as those used for soft drinks, baked beans, fish and meat.

Plastic packaging

such as plastic bottles, milk bottles, soft drinks bottles and detergent bottles, yogurt pots, margarine and ice cream tubs, ready meal trays (but not the black ones) and fruit punnets.

Aerosols

used for furniture polish, deodorants, air fresheners and sprays.

Aluminium foil

such as takeaway food trays, pies, ready meals and tin foil from the kitchen.

Tetra Pak cartons

such as those used for juices, long-life food and drink, soups and smoothies. Please ensure that items are empty, clean, dry and loose!

Polystyrene

cannot be recycled.
