## The Minister Writes



A few weeks ago, the Area's staff met at the URC's Windermere Centre for our annual 24 hour get-together of all URC ministers (and those in close association) in Cumbria. Apart from the usual 'catching up' periods, we had a couple of sessions on a previously chosen book to study - "Blessed are the Crazy", a very personal account of experiences of its author, Sarah Griffin Lund, a Regional Minister of the United Church of Christ. Its sub-heading was "breaking the silence about mental illness, family and church". We found that having read her book, and

speaking to and seeing her live through 'Skype' in her Florida home, that despite her very profound, painful and disturbing experiences of family members, she still had a very positive outlook on life! Indeed, chapter 5 of the book had the title, 'Feeling pain in God's presence' in which she reveals that she came to believe that in life's most difficult moments, when we feel as if God is far away, that the times are ripest for spiritual growth. Not that God takes pleasure in our pain, but in the words of Leonard Cohen (in his song "Anthem" from the album "The Future" released 1992) "There is a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in". Spirituality is making a conscious choice to seek God's presence, and when pain breaks open our hearts, there is a new opening for God's light to enter in. But it's not just in the midst of pain that God can enter in. Sometimes we put boundaries around parts of our lives when we mistakenly believe that God is present

within. It has been determined by the Area's trustees, following a recent simple exercise similar to a quick 'audit' of all the Area's churches, that the spiritual life of our churches is perhaps not as strong as we would expect. On the afternoon of Sunday 7th June, we are holding important workshops, as we seek to determine our vision of the future of the United Area, and what sort of a person we will be seeking to help us fulfil that vision from autumn 2016. Don't miss this opportunity of bringing God's light into this discussion, that the light in the crack may shine so bright that it breaks it open into a glorious chasm of God's presence. Look forward to seeing you there.

## **CUMBRIA METHODIST DISTRICT SPRING SYNOD**

Cumbria Methodist Synod met in the Auction Mart at Junction 36 on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> April. The day coincided with the visit to the District of the current President of Conference, Rev Ken Howcroft and Mrs Howcroft who joined us for the day. Ken preached and presided at the opening service of Holy Communion which was held in one of the auction rings. The President addressed Synod later in the day on the subject of 'Being Methodist in an Ecumenical County'. He urged us to be less self-effacing about the ecumenical progress we have already made, and stated his conviction that we can be Methodists within another kind of church - after all Methodism was originally a movement within the Anglican church. He reminded us that Wesley equipped people to be a holiness movement and then sent them out for mission. He noted that a growing emphasis on discipleship is awakening in people a desire to make a commitment, both in terms of renewed interest in membership and also in taking responsibility for keeping the church 'on the road' (which invites us to ask ourselves - how actively committed are we?) We reflected together on the characteristics of Methodism which the world can't do without.

The business of the day then continued smoothly, with presentations on a variety of topics, including chaplaincies of various sorts, an update on the Argentina link and on progress with the Digital Inclusion project which we have already hosted in the United Area. Synod also approved the winding up of the Methodist Society at Roose and agreed to continue exploring the formation of Mission Communities with our Anglican and United Reformed Church friends and others. Then things got lively! A motion was to be put to Synod inviting us to send a memorial to Conference asking the Methodist Church to disinvest from fossil fuel companies. The ensuing discussion itself generated sufficient hot air on all sides of the argument to contribute to climate change and the motion was eventually withdrawn, leaving other Districts to send the memorial on to Conference. A further memorial was sent on, setting down key questions to be included in a forthcoming review of ministerial training. A number of good news stories from around the District were then shared briefly, including the work of 'Signpost' at Maryport and Little Acorns at Gamblesby which has seen the congregation grow significantly. Synod then ended with the appropriate thanks expressed, followed by a prayer.

Discussions in the Barrow area are making much more progress than they were six months ago and some exciting ideas are emerging - including the ‘pop up shop’ which was trialled in the town centre during the run-up to the ‘Believe in Barrow’ mission. A group of lay and ordained people now meets each week to underpin our discussions with prayer and monthly to discuss the formation of the Mission Community. Until now, the United Area has only been represented by myself and Ron Wilson and we are often able only to attend the ‘business’ meetings and it’s important that the voice of the lay people in our churches is heard everywhere in the process. Karen Edmondson has volunteered to join us at the business meetings - but we could do with additional lay representation. The prayer times are open to anyone who has a heartfelt desire to see our Christian mission furthered in Barrow through our working together as churches. Please give some thought and prayer to this - and speak to Ron or me if you feel this might be something you could be involved in.






