

desert for forty day and nights. I also thought about the purpose of Jesus' time in the desert. And so I spent a lot of time wrestling with God, about life and calling. After a while I began to notice small flowers (metaphorically) and also a path began to appear. And so with the aid of God's spirit I began to pick myself up and walk along this path. It was a path of discernment with pull-in places so I could sit a while with God and rest. Was God still calling me to Ordained Diaconal Ministry and if so what should that be looking like here in Cumbria? How could my heart come back into beat with God's heart, when it was so broken!

I have always had a heart for those on the margins and that was still there. As I sat with God, being renewed and affirmed, I got a call to go for an interview at Haverigg Prison for a Chaplaincy post. I got the position and whilst the prospect of such responsibility is daunting, I do feel that is where God is leading me. I believe that it is God's love that changes the hearts

Having just got back into the saddle so to speak after my sabbatical, I would like to share the following reflection with you. When did you last sit with God and explore what God is calling you to? Is he still asking you to do what you've always done, or is it time for a change??

I started my sabbatical at the beginning of the year and at first, due to personal circumstance, I felt that I had been thrown into the desert. It felt a lonely place and I could not see any path or road out. So I just sat in that lonely place and I began to think about Jesus and how he survived in the real

of people. When we show kindness and respect to others it opens a way forward that can't be opened by condemning people. We love because God first loved us. There are so many broken people in God's world, not just in prison. One of the causes of mental ill health is isolation and low self-esteem. A lot of the men in Haverigg and other prisons have low self-esteem; we need to show them that they matter, that they can still reach their full potential. I personally believe we do that through encouragement and positive reinforcement rather than condemning and punishing. We could all name at least one character of the Bible who has gone against the will of God and yet God still loved them and had a purpose for them, Moses, Saul and David to name a few. God wants to work in people's lives. I believe people are more responsive to love and kindness than they are to rejection and condemnation.

I'm writing this after getting back from our annual Churches Together in Millom Fun Day. It was an amazing day. The sunshine did help, and it was very well attended. Millom Methodists organised and ran a prayer tent with a Narnia theme. This was a wonderful experience for so many.

I would like to share with you a couple of comments from the day and my response in relation to my call.

- Prayer Tent. What's a prayer tent and why do people need to be shown how to pray, don't they know already?

A prayer tent is a space set aside where we make a special effort to make time for God. I actually chose a theme rather than just a blank space because so many people, both church and un-churched, do not know how to pray. This particular space gave people a direction to help with their prayers through a story most knew. It also gave the opportunity for conversation about the connections between Narnia and Jesus (Aslan). It was a very special space.

- Another comment. "Do you know it's always the same people who come to this free day, they just come and are greedy, they have lots of free food all day!"
- My response was, well when I was a child I was number 7 out of 8 and I know for a fact that if there had been a free Fun Day near us when I was growing up we would have gone and my parents would have said, go on get yourself a burger or two it's free!! We do the Fun Day to show people God's unconditional love, we are following God's example of hospitality. If Jesus was here, I'm sure this is one activity he would have attended, if not organised.

So to finish, I know I am still called to Ordained Diaconal Ministry, I am a child of God loved by God and I believe that my calling is still to those on the margins, be that the margins of the prison community or the local community or even the farming community. My heart is now back in beat with the Father's heart of love. May you too take some time to discern what God is calling you to; is it time for a change? Only God knows that answer. I did do lots of other things on my Sabbatical too.



Report from Methodist District Synod held on 28 April 2018

Theme: Vocation/Calling. Go forth and Make disciples!

For our opening devotions we listened to Isaiah 6: 1-8 and Jennet spoke about the following.

If we have a calling then we can presume there is a caller. God who speaks to us all then and now. God who calls all and not just ordained. God calls us all to be His church.

The Call is to:

- Come to God
- To transformation. God changes us, so we can be the best we can be
- Personal Call. What is God calling me/you to do?

God calls us by name; we are to follow Jesus' example of listening and responding to what God is saying.

Moving Mountains:

This took place between 8th-11th March, with 33 Church groupings, 500 events plus Sunday Services. Response Cards were given out but were not utilized well.

Messy Rheged went well with over 2000 attending and there is a possibility of doing this again.

Moving Mountains was not a one-off event, but rather a spring board for what can be done.

Good News Stories:

- **Angels in Stainton**

There was a knitted Angel for every house as a blessing, so this meant they needed to make 700 knitted Angels! They worked ecumenically, got family, friends and local groups involved with this and a grand total of 1000 Angels were made by the end of November. They were then bagged up with a greeting and a Christmas Card with information of all the church services.

- **Nativity @ Brampton**

The Knitted Nativity was dispersed between local shops and put in their windows. The local people then had a sheet of paper with a Nativity Trail on it and locals went round the shops identifying the different characters. The Knitted Nativity then took central place at the Christingle service.

- **Fostering Friendly Churches Scheme**

Fostering in Cumbria talked to us about the need for more carers in Cumbria, to celebrate Foster Carers and to support them. 672 Children are in Foster Care. There are 200 Foster Carers. There is a great need for more Foster Carers so that children can be kept locally where possible. There are a variety of reasons for children needing to go into Foster Care. We listened to some personal stories from current Foster Carers and it was encouraging to hear these.

- **Christian Aid, Haiti & Hope**

We started with a brief history of Haiti which included the impact of climate change. Christian Aid distribute cash through Western Union mainly to women as they believe this gives people more freedom as to how to spend this giving. Money is used for food, to build houses, and other items and resources that will benefit the whole family. It is about

Green Tip

The Methodist Recorder of 2nd March 2018 contained an article about the members of Nailsea Methodist church in Bristol, who decided to try to give up plastic for Lent. Under the banner "It's time to get drastic about plastic" they set a challenge for each of the 6 weeks of Lent, which are summarised below.

Week 1: Don't buy any water in plastic bottles. Choose glass bottles or refill old plastic ones and buy fizzy drinks in cans.

Week 2: Find an alternative to milk in plastic bottles, by switching to glass bottles (although this is more expensive) or ask supermarkets to use glass containers.

Week 3: Avoid buying products in black plastic packaging, which cannot be recycled (as it cannot be identified on the black conveyor-belts at recycling plants).

Week 4: Avoid or reduce plastic wrapping on fruit and veg. Take your own paper bags for loose produce or stick the price label directly on to the item.

Week 5: Take a bag for a walk and pick up all the plastic litter items you find, or join an organised litter-pick.

Week 6: Spread the word, by telling family and friends, commenting on social media and writing to your MP and local supermarkets.

The Synod agreed that we do need to invest in others and asked us to remember such situations in our prayers.

Vocations:

We were encouraged to think about our own individual callings and to reflect on the following three points.

1. The real me
2. The Church local
3. The Church leader

What is our calling all about? It's about abundant life, it's about sharing God's love to all. Maybe God is asking us to give up something, so that we can do something else better??

How we follow Jesus will be different for us all, but we're all in this together. There was a mention of the 1988 report 'The ministry of the people of God'.

We are to serve the wellbeing of society. Mission takes place in a changing society; things aren't what they used to be. We also reflected on Psalm 137 and in particular on how can we sing the Lord's Song in a strange land? What is the Lord's Song where we are as a community and where we are as individuals? What stops us singing the Lord's Song? How do we engage with the local community? What is our incarnational ministry? Synod then broke into four workshops, about which there are reports below.

New District Chair:

Conference Repts:

It was agreed that Conference repts would now be at conference for two years instead of just 1 year.

The use of data for church directories and local church groups. It's important to know what data we already hold. More information available on the Methodist Church Website.

3 Generate:

Children and youth Assembly. This is for children aged between 8-23. There were 1200 places for this year, but 500 have already been booked. The cost is £110.00 per child with help available from each District. There are lots of activities for all ages. They look at Justice issues, do Messy Science, look at marriage and relationships in our ever changing world plus lots more. There are also outside activities.

Memorial to Conference:

There will be a memorial sent to Conference asking Conference to consider agreeing to make local training available leading to ordained ministry to encourage people to candidate for local ministry.

3. The Bible and Vocation

This took a Bible Study format, with 6 small groups each considering one Biblical character and their calling. My group had Moses, with a text from Exodus 3 covering his encounter with the burning bush. The others were Mary (sister of Martha) when she anointed Jesus with perfume, the call of Matthew the tax collector to be a disciple, the choosing of David as King of Israel, Rahab of Jericho helping Joshua's armies and the rich young man coming to Jesus. Each group was asked to think about why the character seemed an unlikely choice for the role they had to play in God's work, what made them able to follow God, what obstacles they faced and how these were overcome, going on to look for parallels in our own lives. There was some intense discussion before each group summarised their responses to the others. Our group spoke of Moses' initial reluctance and feeling that the task was beyond him, and the appointing of Aaron to help him do the bits he couldn't do - we need to work together and use everyone's talents. Despite his doubts Moses listened to God's voice and had faith, even though he expected a hostile reaction. He understood the need to act, as he had seen the suffering of the Israelites in Egypt, and was assured that he would have all God's power on his side. How well do we really understand the needs in our communities? From the group overall, it was striking that the one person who would have been seen to fit in/be successful by society as a whole, the rich man, was the one who walked away disappointed. God uses everyone, however they might


