

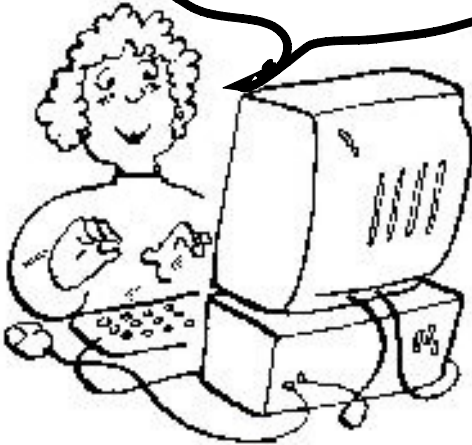

It is not enough to just greet people, however genuinely, we also need to make room for them to belong and contribute to the life of the church. When newcomers offer to help we are too often quick to answer, "No thanks. We've got it covered." Offering radical hospitality may mean making space for someone to serve, not just be served.

In order for us to be truly welcoming our hospitality must also extend past Sunday mornings and beyond the walls of the church building. That may involve inviting someone to go out for a coffee with you or asking them round for dinner. It certainly means making time to get to know people and making new friends. If this sounds scary to you perhaps you could practise on someone

who already attends your church but that you don't know very well or don't normally socialise with! This is how I understand the King's commendation in the Parable of the Sheep and the Goats, "I was a stranger and you invited me in" (Matt 25:35). Can I challenge you to ask yourself two difficult questions?: What do we need to do to ensure our churches are places of belonging and hope for the lost and the lonely? And are we prepared to make the sacrifices necessary to bring about that transformation?

Cumbria's 2016 Christmas Shoebox Campaign Boxes Of Hope

Filling a shoebox is a simple and fun thing to do, doesn't have to cost a lot of money, and it really does make a difference to a child who has none of the basics we take for granted. For these children there is none of the commercialisation we endure for weeks leading up to Christmas. Many of them have never in their lives had a gift. Many have never had a toy.

The campaign runs from November 1st -12th.

If you would like to get involved with this year's 2016 Christmas Shoebox Appeal by filling a shoebox of gifts then here below are some tips of how to do it:

- Find a medium-sized, empty shoebox (PLEASE NO BOOT BOXES), and cover the lid and box separately with any bright wrapping paper.
- Decide whether you want to make a box for a boy or a girl.
- An ideal box will contain: soap and facecloth, toothbrush and paste, hairbrush or comb, hat, scarf, mittens, socks, educational supplies such as paper, pens, pencils, colouring pencils, ruler, rubber and pencil sharpener, and then some sturdy toys such as ball, doll, toy car, dominoes, skipping rope. Add some treats - sparkly hair accessories or bracelet/necklace for a girl, football stickers for a boy, and some sweets. And a cuddly toy will go down well with all ages. A plastic mug will be useful. You may like to add a photo or a greetings card to make the box gift more personal.
- And please add a donation of at least £2, in an envelope inside your box.

Your shoebox cannot be taken overseas unless we can pay for the transport.

Report From Methodist District Synod - held on 10th September at Cockermouth

As always seems to be the case, our Autumn Methodist Synod took place on a lovely, sunny September day. When Synod consisted of no more than listening to a long series of reports, worthy though they might have been, I might have resented just a little spending the time closeted indoors. Thankfully it's a very different experience now and we enjoyed a stimulating and informative day. In particular, we watched a video of the moving and inspiring address by Rev Gareth Powell, Secretary of the Methodist Conference, to the Conference in July. Gareth argued that 'we are the church of Jesus Christ and therefore we have immense confidence and endless imagination because we are resourced by the love of God, the gospel of Jesus Christ and prompted by the Holy Spirit.' He insisted that we do have as a church plenty of resources but not always in the right place - something we need to address urgently as a Connexion. Taking hold in every aspect of our Connexional structures (and that means within all our churches ...) of our missional responsibility is crucial. That requires us all to discover 'how to articulate the gospel where we are at the precise moment'. He challenged us to ask, for example, amongst all the leaflets and information we make available, what those coming in to our church buildings will learn about the saving love of God revealed in Jesus Christ? And he urged us to find ways of building our confidence to speak of God in every context in which we find ourselves. His address is well worth watching - you can find it under the Conference 2016 resources on the Methodist Church website. As the day proceeded, we heard about some of the exciting ways in which churches across the District are using Connexional grants to fund their mission initiatives and were urged by Richard Teal never to think we cannot do something for lack of money as grants are out there. We were encouraged as a District to help support a child in the Nicolas Lowe children's home in Argentina. The missional emphasis continued in the workshops - more of which below - after which we dealt swiftly with the required business of Synod before the closing worship rounded the day off in an appropriately reflective way.

The workshops were led by members of the REACH team, part of the God for All initiative.

Creative Thinking

This was described as ‘taking a sideways look at what you do, in order to more effectively engage people’. It was led by Richard Passmore, who is the Fresh Expressions Enabler on the God for All Reach Team. Fresh Expressions is about helping people explore and develop new forms of Church that can help them connect with the people around them. I had heard about some examples of Fresh Expressions which led to my interest in this workshop.

Richard started by making us think about how conditioned we are to expecting certain ‘things’ when we attend a service and asked us, in groups, to look at the ‘10 Mental Locks’ which can often prevent us from doing things differently.

He asked us to discuss which one most relates to us. He then gave each group a bowl of coloured balls. Each group was asked to come up with ideas for either a Sunday Service or Outreach Event but the difference was that we would be given a random word (produced by a random word generator app) which we had to tie in somehow. We used the coloured balls to look at different stages of planning.

Our group’s word was ‘Charge’. Firstly we focused on the green ball which related to creativity - getting down as many ideas as possible without negativity or judgement, just letting the creativity flow. We then focused on the yellow ball which related to benefits. Analysing the original ideas and looking for positives and plus points. We then focused on the red ball which related to feelings - our intuition, hunches and gut instincts.

Only then did we focus on the blue ball which related to processes and the black ball which related to cautions. It was only when we had brainstormed and come up with some crazy ideas - relating to offering a mobile phone charging service with energy drinks with slogans printed on the cans - that we began to think about the practicalities. The workshop wasn’t really what I’d been expecting but I was stunned by how much we could achieve just by being given a random word and allowing our imagination to work overtime.

Richard recommended a book entitled ‘A Whack on the Side of the Head’ by Roger von Oech which isn’t specifically Christian but is about creative thinking.

This workshop strengthened my view that, as a Church, we need to be creative in the way we reach out to our communities and I realised that, often, the only thing holding us back is our own fears and insecurities.

Foundational Questions

This workshop was led by Emma Richardson, who is a Youth, Children and Families Evangelism Enabler. It focussed on the importance of asking ourselves ‘why’ and ‘how’ we want to do something new, as a church, before deciding ‘what’ to do. Firstly we were all asked to contribute to a list of possible ways of reaching out, things we might like to do as mission in an ideal world where there were no limitations. Then everyone was asked to draw a ‘life map’ showing where they spent their time - work, home, church, leisure activities - and the key people involved there (mine ended up looking rather crowded!). This was to be used to see if any of the mission activities suggested fitted naturally into any of the existing aspects of our lives or with any of the people we knew. This is important because effective mission work has to fit the context and be realistic: it can be dispiriting if an initiative does not reach the people it is aimed at, so we need to give it the best possible chance of reaching them. An idea that has been successful for one church or fellowship will not necessarily work in another and we need to consider this, not just join in with the latest trend. It was also emphasised that people are unlikely to be ready to speak of faith until their basic needs such as food and shelter are met, and they feel they know the person they are speaking to - so some mission may not have obvious evangelism in it but it will be preparing the ground and developing relationships and a sense of ‘belonging’ that may lead people to an understanding of God later on. The time passed quickly and we were given much to think about.

Intentionally Church

Sarah Hulme is also a Youth, Children and Families Evangelism Enabler, and she led this workshop on how we can develop outreach from activities that already go on in many churches, such as Toddler groups. She began by explaining the Revised Engel Scale, a series of negative and positive numbers. The negative numbers range from -10 (God definitely isn’t real) to -1 (Becoming a Christian is the best thing I can do with my life). In the centre of the scale is the statement “I want to follow Jesus.” The positive numbers then range from +1 (Finding out all I can. Trying my best) to +7 (Involved in leadership. Want to see others discover and grow in faith). We then had to consider an activity already going on in our own church or one that is being planned and decide where that would come on the scale. Many of us found this difficult to do, but in the end most of the activities were around the -5 mark, where people have some belief but don’t want to change their lifestyle. The big question is how to move people on from this point - this is where being “intentionally” church comes in. Some members of the group felt that churches could feel ‘stuck’ in doing what is essentially social work; Sarah recommended the website www.wordonthestreets.net for ideas on how to move on from this.

Lebone

This is the third and final part of the summary by Dorothy Gleaves of the **Lebone Village Annual Report**. Thank you to Dorothy for providing this information for us.

“Section 5 Lebone Counselling: Counselling and Social Support

This section continues to provide help in the lives of many people and mostly because of the dedication and efforts of our Administrator, ME Luki Ngcobo. We are confronted more often than we like to be by people who face the challenges of not having legal documentation for themselves or their children, sometimes even for their parents, resulting in them not being able to access social support offered by the government. This is not only the case with adults but also with the numerous children we have in our different programmes/sections. It is definitely not an easy task to help them through this long process but we know that all the sacrifices and months of hard work in the end is more than worth the results.

In a needy community which faces numerous social challenges every day counselling will always be a necessity. We are aware that it is not the counselling alone which helps people through difficult times but that it forms a vital part of the process and the positive results experienced in so many people is heart warming and the knowledge that what happens in this section steers many lives from the road of self destruction to the road of recovery and hope. One of the biggest needs for many years of having our own Social worker was realised in 2014 through the generosity of Kevin Grant and Geoff Lockwood from FNT Logistics in London, continues to empower us in providing quality holistic care to our beneficiaries.

The number of children and families we were able to support and feed grew yet again this past year due to the continued and generous support from Add Hope. Our Ambulatory Therapeutic Feeding Clinic continues to meet the ever increasing demand of malnourished babies and children. When confronted with the massive need of saving lives in our community we praise God for His continued abundant supply through all the many people supporting us. The dedicated and committed role played by Dr Sarah Jane Smith and Nicolien Wydeman, Nutritionist, from Pelonomi Hospital in our ATF Clinic contributes greatly to our success rate of saving the lives of children on a daily basis and it is literally a case of hungry, dying children being given a second chance in life. To see these children being transformed from thin, sick (sometimes dying) babies into chubby, healthy, happy children is just one of the privileges we are able to witness on a daily basis here.

With so much hardship in this world it is easy to believe that we are without hope but through our experiences of generosity and kindness, we have seen that goodness is actually the norm on this planet. There are ‘lights’ shining and doing amazing things despite the darkness.

Success is the fruit of personal effort plus support and encouragement from people like you.

With God's Grace, His provision through His people, the support of all our friends, we will continue to make a difference in the lives of all those we care for!"

To have been a very tiny tiny part of Lebone this year, I feel very honoured to have had the opportunity to be part of this wonderful Village. I would like to add my thanks to Avril's for anyone who reads this report and has been kind enough to contribute in any way. I pray that we are able to continue to make a difference. Methodist Homes Secretary: Daphne has volunteered to do this task.

Date of next meeting: Thursday, 2nd February, 2017 at Dalton Market Street.

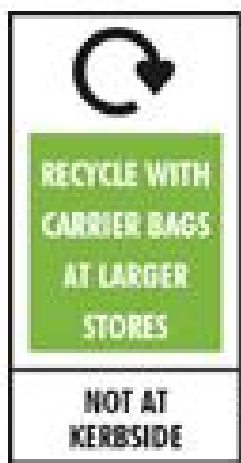

plastic carrier bags, plastic bread bags, plastic bags from breakfast cereals, plastic wrappers from multipacks of cans and plastic bottles, plastic wrappers from toilet roll and kitchen towel, plastic freezer bags, plastic magazine (home delivery) and newspaper wrap.”
