This month's letter comes from the archives, from April 2014. Thank you to Ron for agreeing to this being reprinted.

I write as the period of LENT has already begun, and we've all embarked on the time of self-examination in the light of the trials, tribulations and temptations of Jesus, a period of time which leads us to Jesus' journey to Jerusalem and the cross! Some things we plan, whilst other unexpected events perhaps lead us to take different paths.

So what are you going to do over this coming Easter?

"What are you going to do...?" I wonder how many times we ask that question. Or the related question, "What are we going to do?" often said with excitement, although sometimes in panic!

We spend a lot of time 'doing' or worrying about what we should do, and Jesus' disciples were no different. They had plans for what Jesus should do and shouldn't do, plans for what they should and shouldn't do, and no doubt plenty of ideas for what the government of the day should do! Yet, in the end, when Jesus was arrested and taken off to face trial, they did nothing except scatter like frightened rabbits. Events overtook their plans.

Even the women coming to the tomb early on the Sunday morning had vague ideas about 'doing', arriving in the hope that they would reach Jesus' body to embalm it - only to find that others had apparently already been busy before

them. The stone had been removed and his body gone!

When the other women rushed away ('doing' again!) Mary remained, still and weeping, and then (and only then), is Jesus able to reach her, to show that it is God, and not any human agency, who has acted.

All human plans to 'be good' and somehow to put ourselves right with God are made redundant in an instant, as through his death and resurrection, Jesus breaks the power of sin and death, and opens the way for us to come freely and fearlessly before God, our father and his!

An amazing, wonderful truth!

Stop and think about it. Stop and let the risen Jesus speak to YOU, whether in a quiet moment at home, or through any of our services in the final run-up to this Easter Day, as we recall the Last Supper; the Garden of Gethsemane; Jesus' trial; his crucifixion; his resurrection - hear him speak YOUR name, to assure you of his love and forgiveness.

So..... what ARE you doing this Easter?

May the love and joy of the risen Saviour fill your lives with his peace.

Mission Communities update - Barrow area

There will be a commissioning service for the Barrow Mission Community at 4 p.m. on Sunday April 28th, hosted at the Salvation Army Citadel on Abbey Road and followed by refreshments. Bishop James and Rev Richard Teal will both be present and part of the celebration. It is hoped that this service will also formally recognise the new Mission Community leader, though this is not yet confirmed as a recruitment process is still ongoing (the initial leader Canon Gary Cregeen has stepped down and is due to move to Penrith in May).

The idea for Mission Communities arose as part of the county-wide ecumenical 'God for All' ambition to give every individual in Cumbria an opportunity to learn something of the Christian faith by 2020. There is a formal partnership between four denominations - Church of England, Methodist, URC and Salvation Army - but in Barrow other denominations such as Baptist and Catholic, and independent churches, have also been involved in some events under the 'Believe in Barrow' banner. A group of representatives from the various different churches meet regularly; weekly for prayer and roughly monthly for business meetings. This has already developed new relationships and several mission events have been planned and carried out. The stated aim of the Barrow Mission Community is to be a partnership between the churches in Barrow with the particular vision of working together to know Christ and to make Him better known. To enable this vision the intention is to have a series of connected, vibrant, life giving, worshipping communities... who share responsibility for loving and caring for one another... whilst making and growing wholehearted followers of Jesus in Barrow, so that the whole town might be renewed and experience fullness of life in Christ (this is quoted from the Mission Community website).

While the idea of Mission Communities is still a developing one, the emphasis so far is on working together to help create effective mission and outreach, working together where we can for our common aim of growing God's Kingdom. The churches are also sharing discipleship and training opportunities. The service will recognise what has already been achieved and look ahead to future potential, and all are welcome to attend.

Also as part of 'God for All' and in support of the county-wide Mission Communities, Cumbria-based leaders from the Church of England, Methodist Church, URC & Salvation Army are walking across the county through Lent, with local churches running various events. As part of this on April 1st & 2nd, the Bishop of Carlisle James Newcome and the new Bishop of Penrith, Emma Ineson, will be visiting Barrow (between visits to Dalton and to Millom). The Barrow section will begin at Furness Abbey at 4:15 p.m. in the main car park with an opportunity to meet the bishops and walk with them to St. Paul's Church. The main event will be a 'Real Lives' style event on the Monday evening (7 p.m. for a 7:30 start) at Roose

Conservative Club, with pie & peas and live music as well as an interview with Bishop Emma about her life and faith. It is hoped that this event in particular might give people the opportunity to involve/invite non-Christian friends or those in the early stages of exploring faith. Please book by March 27th by calling 07980 248897, via 'Believe in Barrow' on Facebook or by e-mailing maureendale1942@gmail.com - cost £3 payable on the night. On Tuesday April 2nd there will be a prayer meeting open to all at the Coffee Bean café on Dalton Road from 9 a.m., followed by a programme of prayer visits to local shops and community projects including the Town Hall, re:new and Barrow Island Community Hub.

There will also be a Sunrise Service event on Easter Day, 21st April, in Barrow Park, beginning at 6 a.m. This will be led by either Jennet or Martin Cooper, followed by bacon sandwiches at the Baptist church.

Youth spot

Walney's Cubs enjoyed a sleepover on the Friday at the start of February half-term, in our usual meeting place on Knox St. The Cubs arrived at 6 p.m. and were picked up at 9 the next morning; it was good to have several spending their first night 'away' with us and they all sailed through the experience with no tears or missing home which was great. We're also pleased to have a small group of girls again, after a few years of just one or two, with four attending the sleepover. We had 22 Cubs in total, with four leaders staying overnight ('sleeping' might be a bit of an exaggeration) and a couple of extras through the evening. As it was close to Chinese New Year the main activity was to make Chinese lanterns, like those you might see at the Ulverston Lantern Festival, with tissue paper over a framework of canes. The Cubs thoroughly enjoyed making them, and with small coloured lights attached inside they were very effective when done, but it proved to be a lengthy process. After some ambitious early attempts - a star, a moon and a globe - pyramids proved the most practical design, and while a few at a time worked on their lanterns the rest coloured masks, window hangers and a headband all based on a Chinese theme (lots of dragons, with the red pens in high demand) and had a discussion about Chinese New Year traditions. After that, as masks were still being finished, we had to work out a couple of games that could be played in half the hall - we played the key game, a favourite with the leaders as the children have to be really quiet to play it, and one of our usual ball games (head/catch - do the opposite of what is called out as the ball is thrown to you). This was followed by supper, putting beds out and a film before bed: I'm not sure what it was called but I definitely remember a giant man-eating mallard with teeth..... It was about 2 a.m. before the chattering, pillow fights and trips to the toilet had stopped and the leaders could go to bed, and even then one Cub was asking if anyone else was awake until well after 3 and again from not much after 5! We got up at 7, wrestled sleeping bags back into stuff sacks and found owners for all the scattered socks and other belongings, then had breakfast and sent them off happily home with their bags, lanterns and other crafts. I don't know if any of the Cubs went to bed when they got home but I certainly slept for part of the day as I had two night shifts to finish off the weekend! We're now planning a weekend camp for September.

Christian Aid project

Our latest Christian Aid project will help children in Kenya affected by HIV and AIDS. The amount raised so far is £3088.05.

The following information is taken from the latest update from Christian Aid.

“The Comprehensive Assistant, Support and Empowerment of Orphans and Vulnerable Children (CASE-OVC) programme is a five-year, USAID-funded grant implemented by Christian Aid in Kenya, targeting 171,440 orphans and vulnerable children in 52,000 households. By the end of 2018 we’d raised £407,203, and for every £1 you donate, USAID gives £17 to the project!

2018 project milestones

- 91,940 orphans and vulnerable children received services on health and nutrition.
- 53,118 orphans and vulnerable children received services on child protection and legal support.
- 12,043 orphans and vulnerable children received education support.
- 112,272 orphans and vulnerable children received services ranging from health, nutrition, education, psychosocial support and economic strengthening services for their households.
- 53,227 orphans and vulnerable children were reached with age-appropriate child protection messages on child abuse and report procedures.

Hannah’s Story

Hannah discovered she was HIV+ more than five years ago, but had a limited understanding of antiretroviral drugs (ARVs) and the need for proper nutrition to manage her condition.

Earlier this year, Hannah’s plight drew the attention of our community health workers in her area, and she was enrolled as a beneficiary under our CASE-OVC programme.

Hannah has been trained as a tailor, and received a sewing machine as part of the project. This helped her set up a tailoring business. She now makes 1,000 Kenyan Shillings (around UK£8) per dress, and normally sells two dresses per week.

Because of the nutrition training she receives regularly from the programme, Hannah’s understanding of the importance of ARVs has improved - and so has her health, and that of her children.”

All in a Good Cause

This is the sixth in a series of articles highlighting the charities and causes supported by churches and individuals throughout the Area.

Commitment for Life

Commitment for Life (CfL) is the recommended way for local United Reformed Churches to support Christian Aid and the World Development Movement through committed giving, prayer and solidarity. CfL supports the work of our four partner countries:

1. Bangladesh
2. Central America (Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua and El Salvador)
3. Israel and the occupied Palestinian territory
4. Zimbabwe

It was in 1973 that General Assembly adopted a resolution on a World Development Programme incorporating the 1% appeal or 'a penny in the pound of disposable income'.

Ramsden Street has chosen to support Israel and the occupied Palestinian territory. CfL churches receive mailings three times a year with updates on their partner area. CfL provides information on the four partner countries in the form of inspiring stories, worship materials, images and videos. A yearly worship service outline pack for CfL Sunday is produced and an annual Prayer Partners publication is a resource with prayers for each month.

We are used to thinking of God's generous provision - "my cup runneth over" (Psalm 23) - so

my eye was caught by the title of a conference on the A Rocha website arocha.org.uk

'God Doesn't Do Waste' will remind those attending of the way we should respond to God's love and care for us by taking care of the world He has made. This is the description of the theme of the conference:

"When Jesus fed the 5000 in John's Gospel, he said, 'Let nothing be wasted'. Everything was collected in. This week long conference gets us to think about whole life transformation, for that is the message of the Gospel. God doesn't do waste - and under God's grace nothing is wasted: it can be recycled and used to bring love and new life, whether it be the mess in

our bins or lives. We'll look afresh at what it means to be good stewards of God's beautiful world and how we care for it. We'll consider our attitude to waste and recycling, our unfortunate reliance on plastic, and how God lovingly looks at our lives, saying 'let nothing be wasted'."

One Friday

The last few years have seen a dramatic decline in knowledge of the Bible. Good Friday remains a Bank Holiday, though increasingly shops are open and many people wonder why they've been given a day off work. To keep the story of Jesus alive we need to find new ways of telling it in public places.

ONE FRIDAY is based on fourteen Bible references, often called the 'Stations of the Cross'. The Stations of the Cross represent the events that happened to Jesus as he made the journey from his trial to his execution. So the journey through ONE FRIDAY touches on betrayal, mercy, forgiveness, family, death and finally hope. Each 'station' is interpreted as a painting by artist Jenny Hawke.

Following the stations (by finding the pictures in the windows in Dalton) is a way of following the story of Jesus' road to death. They help us to explore the very human emotions that Jesus felt as he made his way to the cross. As we feel our way through the journey we feel that we are travelling with him - entering into his suffering, as he enters into ours.
